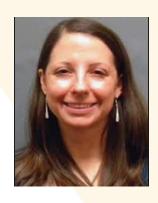

Staffing

- FY22
 - BOCC approved 28 FTE for FY22
 - Hired 15 as of 9/1/2022
- FY23
 - 176.75 FTE approved by BOCC for 2023
 - ~50% of all staff are grant-funded
 - 135 (76%) positions filled to-date
 - 120 TCHD staff "transfers" with start dates 1/1/2023
 - Remainder of positions will be recruited through open, competitive process



Budget and Funding

- Estimate of approx. \$25M in operating expenses for FY23
 - Approx \$19M in personnel costs (80%)
 - \$5-6M in other expenses (i.e, supplies, equipment)
 - Diverse revenue funding grants/contracts, fee-for-service, competitive
 and non-competitive
 - County general fund contribution will be more than what was historically provided to TCHD
 - Greater investment in <u>local</u> public health needs
 - Loss of economies of scaled offered by TCHD arrangement
 - Budget is comparable to similarly-sized jurisdictions with single-county health departments
 - Inaugural years of health department may require more County general funds as proportion of total budget
 - Health department will become more competitive for grant funding over time





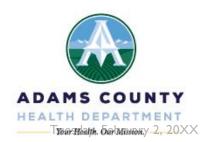
