CALL TO ORDER	The meeting of the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board was called to order by Trevor Hosterman at 5:30 p.m., Thursday, August 13, 2026, via hybrid meeting.
ROLL CALL	Board Present: Trevor Hosterman, Mary Mondragon, Chris Unger, Alex Cook, Council Ex-Officio Katherine Goff Staff present: Amanda Peterson, Parks, Recreation and Culture Director Candice Marchese, Parks, Recreation and Culture Administrative Assistant
APPROVAL OF MINUTES	Chris Unger made a motion to approve the minutes from the July 9th, 2026, meeting, Mary Mondragon seconded the motion, minutes were approved unanimously.
ADDITIONS OR DELETIONS TO THE AGENDA	None
PUBLIC INVITED TO BE HEARD	Chase Janise, Ward 3 addressed the Board regarding prairie dog management and encouraged the City to explore alternatives to extermination and poisoning. Janice discussed the ecological importance of prairie dogs as a keystone species and encouraged the City to research management practices used by neighboring communities.
UNFINISHED BUSINESS /FOLLOW- UP ITEMS	None
NEW BUSINESS: ACTION ITEMS	6a). Facility Reservation Fee Waiver Application: Hulstrom PTA Staff presented a facility reservation fee waiver application for the Hulstrom PTA Fun Run and Barbecue. Staff noted the event has been held previously without issue and serves as a fundraiser for the school. Mary Mondragon made a motion to approve the Facility Reservation Fee Waiver Application. Chris Unger seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously.

6b). Park Vending Permit Application: MSD Ventures, LLC

Staff presented a park vending permit application for MSD Ventures, LLC at Northwest Open Space. Staff noted this was the vendor's first application and that the business primarily sells coffee. The vendor also sells lemonade but agreed not to sell lemonade or lemonade products due to an existing permitted vendor offering the same product at Northwest Open Space.

Trevor Hosterman made a motion to approve the Park Vending Permit Application for MSD Ventures, LLC. Alex Cook seconded the motion. The motion was **approved** unanimously.

6c). Park Vending Permit Application: NEWE, Inc. The People's Powwow

Felicia Alvarez presented the vendor list for the 2026 People's Powwow. Approximately 20 paid vendor booths and one nonprofit booth were identified for the event. Staff recommended approval of the submitted vendor list while allowing event organizers to provide updates to staff prior to the event for vendors who may be added or withdraw.

Trevor Hosterman made a motion to approve the Park Vending permit list. Chris Unger seconded the motion. The motion was **approved** unanimously.

6d). Pollinator Pathway Recognition Request

Staff provided an update regarding the Pollinator Pathway / Monarch Flyway recognition request presented at the July meeting. Following consultation with the City Attorney, staff advised that the proposed recognition could move forward as an educational designation rather than a formal trail naming. This approach would allow educational signage to be installed along the identified trail corridors without changing the existing trail names or requiring the formal 90-day naming process.

Staff also shared examples from neighboring communities using educational signage to identify pollinator habitat, native vegetation, and habitat restoration areas. Signage could be produced in-house at minimal cost.

Trevor Hosterman made a motion to approve educational signage identifying the Monarch Flyway and Pollinator Pathway along the proposed trail corridors. Mary Mondragon seconded the motion. The motion was **approved** unanimously.

6e). 2027 User Fee Schedule Recommendation

Staff presented the proposed 2027 Parks, Recreation and Culture User Fee Schedule. Director Peterson reviewed the annual fee-setting process and highlighted proposed changes intended to align fees with the recently updated Beneficiary of Service Model, market comparisons, cost recovery goals, and actual service delivery.

The Board discussed proposed Fusion Swim Club fees and the significant subsidy currently required to operate the competitive swim program.

An initial motion was made and approved to recommend the proposed 2027 User Fee Schedule to City Council. Following additional discussion during the item, the Board voted to rescind its original recommendation.

Trevor Hosterman then made a motion to recommend approval of the 2027 User Fee Schedule with the department's proposed Fusion Swim Club resident fee increase and a 20% additional increase for non-resident Fusion Swim Club fees. Chris Unger seconded the motion. The motion was **approved** unanimously.

6f). 2027 Budget Recommendation

Director Peterson presented the proposed 2027 Parks, Recreation and Culture operating and Capital Improvement Program budgets.

Proposed budget additions included replacement of Parks Division equipment and implementation of ongoing replacement schedules for cardio and selectorized fitness equipment.

Staff reviewed proposed operating reductions and noted that two previously proposed reductions, annual window cleaning and the Summer Movies Series, had been removed from the reduction list and would remain funded in the proposed 2027 budget.

The Board reviewed vacant and frozen positions and discussed the proposed transfer of funding for two Parks Maintenance Worker positions from the General Fund to the Conservation Trust Fund.

Significant discussion focused on the Fusion Swim Club. Staff reported that the competitive swim program generates approximately \$42,000 in annual revenue while coaching and lifeguard expenses total approximately \$142,000. The Board discussed participation levels, resident versus nonresident participation, proposed fee increases, regional competition, potential nonprofit or private-club models, fundraising opportunities, and the long-term financial sustainability of the program.

Staff also reviewed proposed capital projects, including citywide fence replacement, emergency park repairs, Northwest Open Space Phases II and III, Odell Barry Park improvements, Greenway Trail replacement, playground replacement, theatrical lighting equipment, and future funding for Centennial Park improvements.

Trevor Hosterman made a motion to recommend approval of the 2027 proposed budget to City Council. Alex Cook seconded the motion. The motion was **approved** unanimously.

REPORT FROM COUNCIL EX-OFFICIO

Councilmember Goff shared updates regarding the departure of Arts, Culture and Community Manager Michael Stricker, whose final day with the City will be August 27th. She thanked him for his service and noted that recruitment for the position was underway.

Councilmember Goff also shared that the Diversity, Inclusivity and Social Equity Board had discussed opportunities for more accessible recreation programming and equipment, including adaptive recreational activities. Staff indicated that Parks, Recreation and Culture would participate in an upcoming DICE Board meeting to continue the conversation.

Director Peterson thanked Board members and staff for their involvement in the August 1st Sesquicentennial Celebration. She highlighted the community turnout, Centennial Park planning efforts, and the ceremonial reburial of the City's time capsule.

Director Peterson shared a notable moment from the event involving a community member who, as a high school student in 1975, had helped fold and place an American flag in the original time capsule. The same individual attended the 2026 celebration and participated in folding and returning the flag to the new time capsule.

City of Northglenn Public Facilities Standards

Section 17-1-6. Rules and Regulations. The Parks and Recreation Board may promulgate and the Director may enforce reasonable rules and regulations governing the use and management of public recreation facilities, the rates, fees and charges for use of public recreation facilities and other services provided by the Department, the protection and conservation of such public recreation facilities, and providing sanitation and safety regulations for public recreation facilities, provided that any rules or regulations for violation of which criminal sanctions may be imposed pursuant to Sections 8-2-3 and 1-1-10 of the Municipal Code shall be approved by resolution of the City Council.

- Illegal drug/substance: possession, paraphernalia and use
- Marijuana use and possession, except as permitted by law
- Weapons possession, including realistic toy weapons, except as permitted by law
- Pornography viewing
- Sexual activity or simulated sexual acts
- Fighting
- Smoking cigarettes or e-cigarettes
- Obscene, profane, threatening, abusive or racially disparaging language and gestures
- Public urination or defecation
- Harassment or intimidation of staff, other customers or patrons
- Vandalism, theft, abuse or damage of the facility, including its content and equipment, or another person's belongings
- Consumption of alcohol/liquor except where allowed by license
- Assault or attempted assault
- Any criminal conduct or activity not otherwise listed above

Behaviors that, if deemed inappropriate or disruptive, may not be allowed

- Disruptive noise, music or voices, including, but not limited to, raised voices, yelling or arguing, or other disruption that interferes with the use, operation and enjoyment of the facility
- Being under the influence of alcohol, illegal drugs/substances or marijuana
- Littering
- Obstruction of or interference with walkways or common areas
- Unsanitary hygiene unreasonably interfering with the use and enjoyment of the facility by staff, other customers or patrons
- Panhandling
- Leaving unattended or abandoning personal property, including but not limited to bags and backpacks

Provided however, the prohibited and inappropriate or disrupted behaviors defined above shall not apply to theatrical performances, rehearsals, or other authorized artistic activities conducted in the Theater, including by way of example, but not by limitation, the following:

- Use of realistic nonfunctional toy weapons specifically designed for stage use;
- Simulated sexual activity or simulated sexual acts for clearly staged or choreographed performances;;
- Fighting or simulated acts of violence for clearly staged or choreographed performances;
- Use of non-functional replica cigarettes or e-cigarettes specifically designed for stage use.
- Obscene, profane, threatening, abusive, or disparaging language or gestures where included as part of an approved theatrical performance or rehearsal

General Recreation Center, Senior Center & Theatre Rules

- Children under the age of 12 must be directly supervised by a person 16 years or older
- Patrons 14 years of age and above are allowed to utilize the Weight Room without additional supervision required
- Patrons 12-13 years of age must complete a weight room orientation prior to using the area
- Aquatics – Children 5 years of age and under must be within arm's reach of a parent/guardian and at a minimum ratio of 1:2 (adult/children)
- Proper workout/swim attire required. Shirts are required in all areas of the facility except for the pool and locker rooms
- The following are prohibited:
 - Horseplay, foul language, fighting, tobacco products, chewing gum, glass containers
- Staff has the discretion to allow a proposed use of the facility that complies with posted facility rules, policies, and use requirements. A proposed use that fails to comply with posted facility rules, policies, and use requirements may be denied
- Staff has the authority to expel anyone whose behavior detracts from the enjoyment and safety of the guests and those who fail to comply with the posted rules
 - Individuals issued a suspension may appeal that decision as per the process identified in Chapter 3, Article 7 of the City of Northglenn Municipal Code
- The City of Northglenn is not responsible for lost, stolen or damaged items
- Patrons must possess a membership or pay the daily fee to gain admittance unless the individual, or the individual's dependent, are participating in a scheduled program or event
- Use of restrooms, shall be limited to 20 minutes; use of cabanas, or locker room facilities shall be limited to 45 minutes except for authorized backstage dressing rooms or restrooms used in connection with approved theatrical productions, costume changes, or makeup
- Food and beverages are limited to specific areas of the facility. Beverages must be in non-glass, spill-proof containers
- Photography, videotaping, and other audio or visual recordings must be approved by management staff and are strictly prohibited in all locker rooms and restrooms. Patrons are responsible for complying with all applicable copyright, licensing, intellectual property, and privacy laws, including obtaining any necessary permissions or releases for recorded performances, music, artwork, or other protected material. Posters, signs

and flyers are not permitted in the facility unless approved and posted in designated areas by management

- Bicycles, mopeds, skateboards and scooters are not permitted inside the facility
- Pets are not permitted inside the facility. Service animals are permitted
- Use of baby strollers inside the facility must be approved by management
- Misuse of equipment or failure to abide by facility rules or staff direction may result in loss of center privileges, suspension or removal from the facility, cancellation of the event or activity, and forfeiture of any applicable rental fees, deposits, or refunds. Management reserves the right to give any directions deemed necessary for the safety of the patrons and security of the facility
- All patrons consent to the use of their image, without consideration of payment, in any news broadcasts, commercial broadcasts, advertising, or promotional materials for the City of Northglenn
- It is unlawful to circulate petitions, engage in protest or education, or distribute leaflets or handbills within, or within ten (10) feet of an entrance to, the Northglenn Recreation Center, Northglenn Senior Center, or Parsons Theatre.

In addition, the following rules apply in city parks for the health and safety of all park users:

- Please clean up after your pets
- Use care when using skateboards, inline skates and bicycles on park trails, yielding to pedestrians

To make the park experience pleasant and safe for all guests, the following activities are prohibited in city parks, trails, or other city-owned property:

- Smoking or vaping
- Swimming, wading or being on winter ice
- Motorized or non-motorized boats, with the following exceptions
 - City-owned pedal boats on Webster Lake at E.B. Rains, Jr. Memorial Park
 - Maintenance activities
- Reckless or disruptive use of pedal boats
- Use of non-sanctioned flotation devices
- Motorized vehicles
- Feeding or harassing wildlife
- Inflatable play structures
- Glass containers
- Golf, archery, model airplanes, rockets or other projectiles
- Unleashed pets, with the following exceptions
 - No pets allowed at Croke Reservoir
 - Dogs are allowed off-leash in the fenced area at the Bill Goodspeed Happy Tails Dog Park. The following rules apply:
 - Guardians must pick up after their dogs, carry a leash at all times and be inside the fenced area with their pets
 - Guardians are responsible for their dog's behavior at all times
 - Aggressive dogs, dogs in season and puppies less than six months old are not permitted

- Dogs must be vaccinated
- Guardians may bring no more than four dogs at a time
- Children must be supervised by an adult
- Only bite-sized treats are allowed, no bones about it!
- The city reserves the right to refuse access to any dog or human who is a nuisance because of their own or their pet's behavior
- No bikes, roller blades, skateboards, etc. are allowed at any time
- All general park rules apply

Croke Reservoir is a designated Nature Area, the following additional restrictions apply:

- No pets are allowed at any time in the Croke Reservoir Nature Area
- No bikes, roller blades, skateboards, etc. are allowed at any time

The following are generally prohibited, though permission may be granted through the issuance of a permit. All permit requests are subject to review and approval by city staff, the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board and/or the Liquor Licensing Authority.

- Off-Leash Dog Events
- Alcoholic beverages
- Amplified music
- Organized group use of athletic fields
 - Defined as meeting two or more of the following criteria:
 - Nine or more individuals utilizing a field for organized play
 - Paying a fee
 - One or more times per week for two or more consecutive weeks
- Vending
