Goal 1: Decrease juvenile delinquency

Goal 2: Decrease substance use

Goal 3: Increase high school graduation

Since 2005, we've made great progress toward these goals:

- Juvenile justice filings have decreased by 42% and violent and repeat offenses are down 84%
- The number of seniors who graduated from high school in four years increased by 1.84 percent from 2010 even larger increase than the state average (1.5 percent)






High School Graduation on the Rise

Juvenile Crime Filings Down




